- Article 5 Students are required to complete an internship for thirty-six (36) hours in Chinese-language teaching. See internship requirement rules.
- Article 6 All other relevant matters not covered in these policies shall be governed by the "CYCU Academic Policies" and relevant regulations.
- Article 7 This guideline has been carried out the review of the Academic Affairs Meeting. Any revision to this guideline will follow the same procedures.

Instruction:

I. The School Regulations:

- A. The "KQ-Sciences" and "IQ-Literature & Rhetoric" in the General Education Program are mandatory and must be completed during the freshman year. Regarding the "IQ-Literature & Rhetoric" courses, the Chinese Literature Classics should be taken during the first semester of the freshman year, while the Literacy and Rhetoric should be taken during the second semester of the freshman year."
- B. The General Education elective courses are divided into four categories: GQ-The Creator, EQ-Humanity, KQ-The Entire Creation, and IQ-The Individual Self. At least two credits must be taken in each category, with a total of 12 credits required to fulfill the requirement.
- C. The Computer Information Related courses, which must have a minimum of 2 credits, should include instructional content on programming design or programming language application. Additionally, at least one-third of the total teaching hours should be devoted to this topic. The courses aim to cultivate students' abilities in logical thinking, logical operation, and the use of technology for innovative learning.
- D. From the 101 academic years, undergraduate students are required to pass the English proficiency test recognized by the school to be eligible for graduation.
- E. From the academic year of 2014 onwards, fifth-year high school students are required to take additional 6 credits both for general education courses and professional courses.
- F. Students enrolled in bachelor's degree programs are required to take 2 EMI courses before graduation. [Excluding English (I)&(II), English Listening and Speaking in Lab (I)&(II), Practical English (I)&(II) and Business School Business English Conversation (I)&(II), Skills for English Language Testing (except for ALLS students)
- G. The scope of other elective courses includes minor, double major, Interdisciplinary Course Program, Employment Program, Micro Program (including from other departments), PBL courses, MOOCs micro-credit courses (1 credit per course, up to a maximum of 6 credits), and Profession Self-Directed Learning (up to 2 credits).
- H. For the courses and grades issues, please consult the related regulations according to "CYCU Academic Policies".

II. Graduation Regulations of the College:

1. Students are required to pass "Ethics in Education," a special general education course in the category of Humanity in the General Education Curriculum, before graduation.

III. Graduation Regulations of the Department:

- 1. Second Foreign Language Conversation: Students are required to take one of the foreign language conversation courses (except English) offered by the Department of Teaching Chinese as a Second Language (hereafter the Department or TCSL). Students are exempt from this requirement if they have passed the High-Intermediate level of GEPT (The General English Proficiency Test). However, these students should fulfill the credit requirement by taking the Department's elective courses.
- 2. Students are required to earn at least 8 credits of second foreign language (except English) courses in one language.
- 3. Students are required to complete an internship for thirty-six (36) hours in Chinese-language teaching.
- 4. Students who registered for the Undergraduate Program in Teaching Business Chinese are eligible

to use the "Marketing Management" course and "Practice of International Trade" course offered by the College of Business to count toward elective credits for the TCSL requirements. However, these two courses cannot be counted as required courses for double majors or minors in the College of Business.

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
